A Message from the Foundation

Each year brings new opportunities and this year was no different. Throughout 2017 and 2018, the Foundation gathered data for our first Vital Signs® report.

Research Director James Popham and his research team gathered data on ten key areas that are crucial to community vitality. More than 400 community leaders, public figures and citizens provided input for the report which provides a snapshot of our community at this point in time.

Some of the data may surprise you or concern you. We ask you to identify areas where you might be able to improve a statistic in a positive way and then, take action. Please contact the Foundation office for information or copies of the Vital Signs® report.

In April 2018, board members reviewed the progress of the three year strategic goals set out in 2015. The goals of endowment building, educating the public about philanthropy, and building the impact of our grants are relevant and were reconfirmed for the next three years with annual reviews.

Our Board continues to dedicate their energy towards building our endowed assets through donations or planned gifts. Donors showed their generosity and willingness to plan for the future of the organizations that they support. Donations of \$2,183,908 were received this year and 12 new Funds were created.

As our assets grow, the amount available for our grant program increases as well. This year 87 local charities received grants totalling over \$455,000 and we are proud that this is the largest amount to date. Please enjoy the grant stories on page 9.

- Continued to meet with local charities about agency Funds and grant opportunities



Year In Review







June 2017

In June, the Youth Advisory Committee volunteered to assist at the St. Andrew's Soup for the Soul community meal program by donating a homemade dessert and serving meals for over 150 guests.

The Foundation held the 9th annual Community Leaders Breakfast with keynote speaker Jim Kent, retired Superior Court Justice for the Brant area and former Foundation Nominating Committee Chair. He related his experience in the community and stressed the importance of volunteering and giving back.

September 2017

The Social Sciences Research Laboratories of the University of Saskatchewan conducted a quality of life survey in our community for the Vital Signs® Report. Research Director James Popham and his research team built partnerships with organizations willing to share local information for the Vital Signs® report.

The Norah Langton Music Awards, the Thomas E Taylor Bursary for an engineering student, the Mary Welsh Brant Waterways Environmental Scholarship, the John Wilkin Business Scholarship and the Jeffrey Wilkin Engineering Scholarship were awarded.

October 2017

At the 20th annual general meeting, Board Chair Jim Steele welcomed Justice Gethin Edward, Nominating Committee Chair. Justice Edward introduced the two new members Chuck Beach and Larry Davis. David Bailey, incoming Board Chair, thanked Jim Steele for his service as chair for the last two years stating that Jim has been an inspiration to all and that he looks forward to continuing to work with him.

November 2017

The Brant Community Foundation Random Act of Kindness Day Committee members and over 50 volunteers celebrated another fun-filled, successful day. 17 teams spent the day spreading good by doing random acts of kindness throughout Brantford, Brant County, Six Nations of the Grand River and Mississaugas of the New Credit. Youth Advisory Committee members took part by handing out over 300 'goodie bags' at their schools and creating a kindness board to share views on kindness.

The message of kindness and paying it forward was well received.


December 2017

Brant Community Foundation grants totaling over \$327,000 were presented to 79 charitable organizations at Apps' Mill Nature Centre, one of the organizations receiving a grant. The grant program supports initiatives that strengthen the community and address changing needs. The grants awarded were in response to grant applications received as well as grants from donor advised funds.

January 2018

Youth Advisory Committee members reviewed grant applications and awarded grants to Brant Family and Children's Services Foundation, Kids Can Fly, Paris Port Dover Pipe Band, and Tutela Park Splash Pad Committee. Grants totaled \$4.000.

The Foundation held six sessions with citizens representing specific demographics which began in January and continued through February. Participants shared opinions and offered insights about our community for the Vital Signs® project.

February 2018

The Muslim Association recognized several people and organizations in the community at their first awards presentation. Board member Lucy Marco received the Social Service award and the Brant Community Foundation was presented with a certificate of appreciation for Outstanding Community Service.

March 2018

In coordination with Wilfrid Laurier University's Human Rights and Human Diversity program, the Foundation's application for an intern was approved under the Ontario's Career Ready Fund. The internship was approved for 16 weeks giving the student valuable professional work experience.



April 2018

Four community members were chosen as the 2018 recipients of the Lifetime Achievement Award for Outstanding Volunteerism: Ross Enslev from the City of Brantford, Mel Osborne from the County of Brant, Carol Tobicoe from Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation and Steven Williams from Six Nations of the Grand River Territory. Legacy funds at the Foundation were created in honour of each of the recipients.

Youth Advisory Committee members, Foundation volunteers and friends had a great turnout at the Rotary Classic Run.

May 2018

During this month, 21 grants from our donor designated funds were granted totalling \$55,700.

Awards from the Sharon Elaine Sienko Memorial Fund were presented to 7 Grand Erie District School Board students whose actions showed they were everyday heroes in their school community.



Donor Story

Justice Edward O. Fanjoy

The establishment of the Justice Edward O. Fanjoy Fund was the perfect way for the Fanjoy family to honour a highly accomplished man while giving back to the community Ed called home for 38 years.


Born on September 6, 1922 in Hartland, New Brunswick, the eldest of 8 children, Ed passed away on March 3, 2010 in his 88th year at the Stedman Community Hospice.

Ed graduated from Normal School (Fredericton) in 1940 and joined the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1941. During WWII he was a radar technician in the RAF Squadron. After the war, he attended UNB and became the Valedictorian of the first post wartime class. He had a quick mind and a flair for language which he honed as a member of the Eastern Canadian Intercollegiate Debating Team which won the Eastern Championship in 1948.

On August 20, 1949, he and his life partner, Margaret, were married at Greenoch Presbyterian Church in St. Andrew's-by-the-Sea, NB. He obtained a Science Degree in Geology and in '51 obtained a Law Degree from UNB. In the same year he was awarded an overseas Beaverbrook Scholarship to study at the London School of Economics for a year. Whilst studying in London, through Lord Beaverbrook he had the honour of meeting Sir Winston Churchill.

Ed practiced law in Peterborough, ON, for 3 years and in 1955 relocated to St. Thomas, ON, to set up his own practice with long-time friend Harold Stafford.

He always believed in 'giving back' as evidenced by his many volunteer commitments. While living in St Thomas, Ed served as President of the YMCA, member of the library board, member of the Planning Board, President of the Lions Club and also served as Mayor of the municipality. Called to the Bench in 1972, the family relocated to Brantford. He served as a Superior Court Justice until 1997 and was a member of the Pension Appeals Board until 2008. In Brantford, Ed served on the Police Services Board for 20 years and in his spare time he was the author of the manual for Police Commissions and sat on

the Committee that wrote the Police Services Act. He also sat on the Paris Police Commission. He was a long-time member of the Rotary Club of Brantford and was a golfing member of Brantford Golf and Country Club.

Very much a family man, he loved spending time with his wife, children and seven grandchildren. His greatest sorrow was the passing of his son David at the age of 23 while mountain climbing in the Canadian Rockies.

In 2017, Margaret was proud to gift monies to the Brant Community Foundation in memory of Ed. Ed was a long time trustee on the Blacker Benevolent Trust and the C. Gordon Cockshutt Foundation that merged with the Brant Community Foundation. "He was very proud of the work done by these charities so the Brant Community Foundation was an excellent fit for a memorial donation", stated Marg Fanjoy, "and the monies will be used in perpetuity for the benefit of the entire community."

Our Grants Building Community

2018 was a record year for Foundation grants with \$455,288 in funds being distributed to local charities. Our grants support projects that enrich our community and all of us in it. They preserve the past and create the future.

Grant Highlights

Tehotikahrathe:tha - Their Eyes Sparkle!

Tehotikahrathe: tha means Their Eyes Sparkle and the Mohawk Language and Youth March Break Camp certainly makes the children's eyes sparkle!

This free program for Indigenous youth from Brantford and surrounding areas reconnects participants to their ancestral language, culture and songs. The program has been run at the Brantford Campus of Wilfrid Laurier University since 2015, facilitated by Laurier's office of Indigenous Initiatives.

Campers learn how to sing, dance and introduce Iroquoian songs as well as learning a short version of the Thanksgiving address. The rich history of local Indigenous peoples is showcased while building confidence and pride in their Indigenous ancestry. On the last day, their families are invited to join the campers in a cultural celebration.

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Imagination Library

Higher literacy skills and a love of reading!

The Imagination Library, a program of Kids Can Fly, helps instil a love of reading. Each month, a quality, age appropriate book is sent to registered children from birth to age 5. This year in Brantford/Brant, 1,878 children were in the program and over 1,200 have graduated. Although these numbers are impressive, it is only about 25% of local children aged 0-5.

Reading to young children is the single most important thing that parents can do to help strengthen their child's brain and literacy skills. Books from The Imagination Library give children the chance to have higher literacy skills, thus the likelihood of success in school is much greater.

Having one's own books in the home is an investment in the future of our community and a wonderful gift for our children. It is exciting when the book arrives by mail and encourages family time as parents read to their children.




